"One Ring to Rule Them All": Magic Rings in the Western Tradition Spring 2015 Prof. Christopher Weimer

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Course Objective

The goal of this course is to examine the recurrent use in Western literature and philosophy of magical rings which bestow powers upon those who wear them, beginning with Plato's *Republic* and concluding with contemporary fantasy literature and the graphic novel. What do such rings symbolize and why do authors keep returning to them? What do the specific textual treatments of the various rings show us about the cultures and eras in which they were written?

Essays

During the course of the semester, you will write four essays: one on either Chrétien de Troyes or La Motte-Fouqué; one on Wagner's *Ring* or *The Saga of the Volsungs*; one on Tolkien's *LoTR*; and finally, one on a topic of your choice, decided in conjunction with the professor. The first three papers will have a 1000-word minimum and the fourth will be longer, with a 2000-word minimum.

Exams

We will have two exams, one after we finish Wagner's *Ring* and then the final exam (scheduled for Thursday, May 5th at 10:00 a.m.). Both will be "blue book" written exams, consisting of essays and/or short answer questions. You will need to bring your own exam booklets.

In this class, you can earn a maximum of 1000 points, divided equally between essays and exams.
